LEGISLATORS TAKE A "SPRING BREAK" FROM JEFFERSON CITY

With Legislative Spring Break upon us, now is a great time to contact your legislators while they have time in the district to discuss bills of importance to municipal utilities:

266 Anti-Municipal Broadband/Utility Services - This bill came out of committee last week and is set to head to the Senate floor for debate. Promoted Centurylink and hv telecommunication providers, the limits efforts by governments in out-state areas to increase broadband connectivity, foster public private partnerships, and increase consumer-friendly services. *Three of the state's largest cities are exempt making this clearly a rural/out-state anti-

economic development bill. What's worse is that the bill includes water, electric, and natural gas. MPUA put out a press release on Friday opposing the bill- see it here. Talking points found here.

HB 481 - Net Metering - This proposal make changes to the state's net metering laws by eliminating the size of units currently 100 kW - that customers of any class can connect to the local distribution system and expect payment for generation at retail rates. The House Energy and Environment committee voted the bill out of committee after several meeting of testimony. MPUA and the coops were successful in amending the bill to exempt utilities with 10,000 meters or less and replacing the 100kW capacity cap. However, we don't expect the changes to stay. Emails to the House Utilities chairman and your legislator are warranted. You can find a sample email here.

SB 222 - Right-of-Way - This measure has not been reported out of the Senate Commerce, Consumer Protection, Energy and Environment However, Senator Committee. Kehoe, the Committee Chair, indicated he did want to act on the MML and CenturyLink are expected to work out differences and bring a substitute bill to the Committee when the Senate returns from Spring Recess. League staff is currently in negotiations with CenturyLink. See MML's latest talking points here.

Current Bill Summary

SCS/SB 266 - Under this act, beginning August, 28, 2015, no municipality may begin to offer a service that is being offered by at least one provider of solid waste collection, wireless service, broadband or other internet protocol enabled service, video service, telecommunications, gas, electricity, water, or sewer service within the boundaries of the municipality without a vote of the people.

This act does not apply to services that a municipality is prohibited to offer by law or services that have an annual fiscal impact of less than \$100,000.

In order to pose the question to voters of whether to authorize the municipality to provide a service otherwise prohibited under this act, the municipality must publicly release a study of the feasibility of offering the service and the financial implications at least 90 days before the election and determine the total estimated cost of the project for the next five years.

If the question fails to receive a majority vote, it cannot be resubmitted to voters for two years.

If the service is provided by the municipality, this act prohibits financial subsidization of the service from revenue collected from other services offered by the municipality and municipal funds being used to support the service unless the voters approve a specific revenue stream for it.

This act does not apply to Kansas City, Springfield, or the City of St. Louis.

Dear Senator Cunningham:

My name is Sam Burt and I am the City Administrator for the City of Seymour MO.

I am writing today to voice my opposition to SB 266.

Here are the reasons for my opposition:

This bill impacts more than just broadband networks. It would limit tree trimming, sewer lateral programs, trash service, public-private partnerships, and street maintenance – in essence it limits our town for economic development and competitiveness in all areas.

This bill denies private local companies access to advanced broadband networks and ever advancing technological and commercial needs. Therefore, it prevents local investment to attract high-tech industries.

Furthermore, the bill states that our city may not provide a competitive service that is being provided by at least one private service without a vote of the people. A vote of the people requires a study of the feasibility of the service and financial implications of the service ninety days prior to the vote. Also, a total cost of the project for the next five years must be provided prior to the vote. I see no advantage to this city in the passing of this bill.

Respectfully, I request that you do not support this bill.
